FATHER DEMETRI'S MESSAGE

Let's not let this dream become reality

Allow me to share a story with you:

A priest had a dream the other night that every volunteer in this land had set sail for another country. He stood smiling on the pier shouting "goodbye phone committees; no

information gatherings; no more playground duty, bake sales, three-hour meetings, or helping at the church, teaching Sunday School and taking care of youth."

As the priest went on his daily routine, he went to the hospital and found it quiet as he walked around. The reception desk was vacant. Rooms were empty of books, flowers and voices. The children's wing held no clowns, no laughter and no activity.

The home of the aged was like a tomb. The blind listened for a voice that never came. The infirm were imprisoned in wheelchairs that never moved. Food grew cold on trays that would never reach the hungry.

Social agencies had closed their doors, unable to implement their programs of counseling or drug and alcohol control. Health agencies had signs in their windows: "Cures for cancer, birth defects, multiple sclerosis, heart disease, etc. have been canceled because of lack of interest."

The schools were strangely quiet with no field trips and no volunteer classroom aides.

Flowers in the church withered and died. Children in day nurseries lifted their arms, but there was no one to hold them, love them or teach them. Children in Sunday School classes sat with their hands folded, waiting to be taught, yet no one entered the classroom door. The poor had no one to help them.

The priest fought in his sleep to regain a glimpse of the ship of volunteers just one more time. He knew that this was going to be his last glimpse of a decent civilization.

My beloved brothers and sisters:

Volunteers, my dear friends, are the backbone of our church. Without them our doors would close. Without the volunteers to serve on the Parish Council, or the volunteers to serve in the Ladies Philoptochos, or the volunteers to serve as chanters or in the choir, or to teach in our Sunday School, or to serve in the Holy Altar, or to advise the youth, or to minister to the old, or to visit the sick – we could accomplish *nothing*.

The reward is knowing that *you* are doing something. Something that no one else but you can do. Our Lord said: "The harvest is plentiful, but the workers are few." All of us have talents in one area or another. It is up to us to put these talents to work.

At this time, I would personally like to thank all of the volunteers who gave their time, talent and treasure for our Greek Fair. Without all of you, this event would not have been a success. God bless you and your families. Thank you!

Philoptochos looking forward

Clergy-Laity Philoptochos Delegates

The Transfiguration Ladies Philoptochos Society was well represented at the 39th Biennial Clergy-Laity Congress held recently in Washington, D.C.

Patricia Mahoney and Olivia Sintros, first and second Philoptochos vice presidents respectively, attended as delegates, as well as Transfiguration Philoptochos past presidents and national Philoptochos board members Yiota Simoglou and Daphne Zaralidis.

The theme of the 2008 National Philoptochos Biennial Convention was "Looking Forward: The future is something we create, not something we enter."

National President Georgia Skeadas culminated her third, two-year journey with an impressive report. She announced all the major disbursements to Philoptochos programs and projects and to hospitals and research programs throughout the United States amounting to \$715,258.

The national Philoptochos also disbursed nearly \$2.27 million over the past two years and more than \$8 million to its many charitable programs and activities during President Skeadas' six-year term of office.

Like our sister chapters all over the country, our Transfiguration Philoptochos has proudly played an important part in accomplishing this outpouring of funds through our support of our national and discretionary commitments.

The following are some highlights of the accomplishments of Philoptochos from her detailed report:

- Continuing support of care facilities, which serve the aging Greek Orthodox population, as well as St Basil's Academy.
- Establishing the Philoptochos
 Emergency Fund as a discretional national commitment enabling Philoptochos to immediately respond to those in need in times of national and international disasters.
- Promoting literacy through the Philoptochos Literacy Outreach Program.
- Continuing the Philoptochos' Wheelchair Foundation Project by sending wheelchairs to the Republic of Georgia and to Greece.
- ♦ Sending \$50,000 to the Hellenic Red Cross for fires in Greece with an additional \$160,000 in response to Archbishop Demetrios' appeal. An additional \$25,000 was also sent to Southern California to assist for the devastating fires.

- ♦ Disbursing the \$523,000 realized from the Children's Medical Fund Luncheon among the Children's Hospital and Children's Medical Programs in the Metropolis of San Francisco and a donation of \$25,000 for the Autism Speaks Program.
- ♦ Establishing scholarships for deserving females of the Holy Cross School of Theology.
- Establishing the Philoptochos website www.philoptochos.org.
- Developing "Philoptochos Voice" in The Orthodox Observer. one page that features one metropolis in each issue to share information and ideas.
- Supporting the development of a "Directory of Services for Older Adults" by the Philoptochos Department of Social Services (to borrow a copy, contact Susan Pappas, Philoptochos president).
- ◆ Establishing "Go Red Sunday" to increase awareness of Heart Disease (Yiota Simoglou and Daphne Zaralidis received kudos for this very important campaign).

As delegates and members of Philoptochos, we were honored to have represented our chapter.

We are very proud of our accomplishments as a national organization, as a chapter in the Metropolis of Boston, but more importantly as members of the Transfiguration Philoptochos, which has worked tirelessly not only to meet all its commitments on the national and metropolis levels, but also to make a difference in meeting the needs of our parish family and our local community.


FEAST DAY OF THE MONTH

October 23: James the apostle

According to some, this saint was a son of Joseph the Betrothed, born of the wife that the latter had before he was betrothed to the Ever-virgin. Hence he was the brother of the Lord, Who was also thought to be the son of Joseph (Matt. 13: 55).

But some say that he was a nephew of Joseph, and the son of his brother Cleopas, who was also called Alphaeus and Mary his wife, who was the first cousin of the Theotokos. But even according to this genealogy, he was still called, according to the idiom of the Scriptures, the Lord's brother because of their kinship.

This James is called the Less (Mark 15:4) by the Evangelists to distinguish him from James, the son of Zebedee, who was called the Great. He became the first Bishop of Jerusalem, elevated to this episcopal rank by the Apostles, according to Eusebius (Eccl. Hist., Book II: 23), and was called Obliah, that is, the



Just, because of his great holiness and righteousness.

Having ascended the crest of the Temple on the day of the Passover at the prompting of all, he bore testimony from there concerning his belief in Jesus, and he proclaimed with a great voice that Jesus sits at the right hand of the great power of God and shall come again upon the clouds of heaven.

On hearing this testimony, many of those present cried, "Hosanna to the Son of David." But the Scribes and Pharisees cried, "So, even the just one hath been led astray," and at the command of Ananias the high priest, the Apostle was cast down headlong from thence, then was stoned, and while he prayed for his slayers, his head was crushed by the wooden club wielded by a certain scribe.

The first of the Catholic (General) Epistles written to the Jews in the Diaspora who believed in Christ was written by this James.

Church News

Parish Council

The Parish Council addressed the following issues when it met on Sept. 17:

Assembly date set: The fall Parish Assembly has been scheduled for Sunday, Nov. 2, after the Divine Liturgy in the church hall. Parishioners should receive the formal notice in the mail later this month.

Budget update: Treasurer James Murphy reported that the balance of the operating budget stood at \$5,007.33 at the end of August. Expenses are \$21,000 higher than a year ago at this time, he said, and stewardship continues to lag behind last year's pace. The current amount due on the parish's building loan with Enterprise Bank is \$502,538.59.

Rain damage: President Nick Manolis reported that the heavy rains during the week of the Greek Fair resulted in new areas of leaks in the choir loft. To make matters worse, the towers continue to leak and cause problems. Nick said he would have more information in time for the council's next meeting.

Protective columns: Treasurer James Murphy reported he is waiting to hear from the city about the guidelines for installing protective columns at the bottom of the hill in front of the church before winter.

Next meeting: The council will next meet on Wednesday, Oct. 8, at 7 p.m. in the boardroom.

The end of summer brought with it a trickle of stewardship cards – 10 to be exact – but not nearly enough to reverse a negative trend that threatens to make the parish's 2008 stewardship program the least successful in decades. With only a few months left to go this year, the number of families or individuals who had returned their stewardship cards as

of mid-September was 408, 33 less than last year at this time for a decrease of 7.5 percent; likewise, stewardship income was down more than \$10,000 or nearly 7 percent.

Specifically, the 408 stewards had contributed or pledged \$140,061.24 so far this year, which breaks down to an average pledge \$343.29. That's up only slightly (\$2.18) from the same time last year.

Given the parish's operating budget was carrying a balance of only \$5,000 at the end of August – the lowest at this time of year in recent memory – it is imperative that parishioners with outstanding stewardship cards return them to the church office as quickly as possible. 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
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
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
